EDITORIAL

What Does The Bible Teach?

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding"

To trust in the Lord means to trust in His word, to trust Him in what He has spoken or said. In His parable of the wise and foolish men, Christ compared the wise man to a person who hears His teaching and does them; and the foolish man to an individual who hears His teaching and does not do them. (Matthew 7:24-27). This was exactly the point the writer in Proverbs 3:5 was making. All men everywhere need to learn this most important teaching of the Bible. To trust in God does not mean to just believe in Him that He exists, and hears and sees; but it means to do things in the manner in which He has commanded. But man has always violated this serious command of God. We have numerous examples of this in the Bible, from which only one is listed below for our learning.

During the forty years sojourn in the wilderness when the Israelites were in Kadesh there was no water there. So they all began to speak against Moses and his brother Aaron, who were their leaders, appointed by God. Moses and Aaron prayed to God to help them. God heard their prayer and told Moses: "Take thy rod; you and your brother Aaron gather the assembly together. Speak to the rock before their eyes, and it will yield its

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water; thus you shall bring water for them out of the rock, and give drink to the congregation and their animals." What did God say to Moses? He said, go and speak to the rock before their eves. What did Moses do? We read: "So Moses took the rod from before the Lord as He commanded Him. And Moses and Aaron gathered the congregation together before the rock; and he said to them, "Hear now, you rebels! Must we bring water for you out of this rock? "Then Moses lifted his hand and struck the rock twice with his rod; and water came out abundantly, and the congregation and their animals drank. Then the Lord spoke to Moses and Aaron, "Because you did not believe Me, to hallow Me in the eyes of the children of Israel, therefore you shall not bring this congregation into the land which I have given them." " (Numbers 20:8-12). God was not pleased with Moses and Aaron. did they not both believe in God? Sure they did. They prayed to God, and God listened to their prayers. But they did not trust God: they did not believe that God wanted them to do exactly as He had commanded them to do, and that He would do what He had promised to do. Later, Moses wrote to the children of Israel, in Deuteronomy 3:25,26, that how he had pleaded with God to let him enter the promised land, but God would not let him do that because He was displeased with Moses on their account.

Not only should we hear and learn from the Bible, but we must do things God has commanded in His book, to be pleasing unto Him and to be eternally saved in heaven.

The Name Of The Whole, Family

"A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches, and loving favour rather than silver and gold" (Proverbs 22:1). Why is the name so important? Because it represents you: who you are, what you represent, the principles and convictions you stand for, and your future. Whether a physical name or a spiritual name, it tells the story within itself.

As members of the Lord's family, we are to wear the name

of the One who saved us. This identifies the One to whom we belong, whom we are following, and whom we wish to honour. That One, of course, would be Jesus Christ and the name we wear would be Christian. To wear some other name would be to dishonour the Lord. In Acts 11:26 we read that "the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch." After Paul had preached to King Agrippa, the king said that he had almost been persuaded to be a Christian (Acts 26:28). Why just a "Christian" and not some other name, or some name in addition to "Christian"? Because Paul and all of his brethren were Christians only at that time. Peter said, "Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on this behalf" (1 Peter 4:16). If one believes in Christ and has obeyed the Lord's will, how can he be anything else other than a Christian? If he is something else, he is not truly a Christian, in the same sense as in the New Testament times.

Now if one is a Christian as a result of obeying the Lord, being saved, and being added to the Lord's church, then what does that make a group of Christians, an assembly, a body of people? Paul answered that question when he said, "For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named" (Ephesians 3:14,15). Now notice that the whole family—not part of it—but the whole family is named after Christ. Some of its members are in heaven and some are on this earth, but in either case, the Lord's church wears His name. Why would we wear any other name if we are truly the church of Christ? In Romans 16:16, when Paul was speaking of a group of congregations, he identified them as being "the churches of Christ".

The scriptures also speak of the body of Christ, which is the church of Christ, (1 Corinthians 12:27), the kingdom of Christ or the church of Christ (Ephesians 5:5), the house of God or the church of Christ (1 Timothy 3:15), and numerous other descriptive and identifying titles showing that this body of people belongs to Christ and wears His name.

James says, "Do not they blaspheme that worthy name by the which ye are called?" (James 2:7). What were they called? They were called Christians as individuals and the Church of Christ as a body. James said there were those in his day that were blaspheming that name, mocking it, and condemning it, but

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also there were those who were wearing that name. Likewise, today, when one wears some other name, or some man-made name, it means that he is forsaking the Lord's name; he is rejecting the name that is above every name, the name of Christ.

How can anyone today even begin to think about wearing some name that is not found in the Bible, or some word or name that is in the Bible—such as "Pentecost" or "holiness," but was not intended to be worn by a follower of Christ or by his church? You may choose to wear another name if you wish, but in doing so you are rejecting the Lord. To reject the Lord's name is to reject Him. In this world or in the world to come, you will finally be faced with the truthfulness of that statement.

"Andrew, when you come home from work we need to go to the hospital to visit Martha and to comfort her family. She's growing weaker day by day, and the doctors give them no hope that she'll recover. I know she's old, but they're such a close family, and losing her will be hard for them—for all of us, because she's been a faithful part of the church for so many years. It will seem strange to assemble for worship and not to see Martha there, and not to have her help in the other work we do as a group."

"I know how you feel. I've been thinking about their grief, and the grief of the church. I've decided to teach a lesson on this subject Sunday."

The visit was made, though Martha was too weak and ill to know that Andrew and Rachel were there. They talked at length with Martha's sons. Jonathan was a Christian, but Anthony lived in a distant city and had had no interest in spiritual things. He had been surprised to see the concern shown by the church, the steady flow of visitors, and the food that had been brought daily

to Jonathan's house. In his own life, he realized the absence of such support.

On Sunday, Andrew got up to present the lesson for which he had made special preparation. He had prayed earnestly that God would help him to put into the minds and hearts of the Christians the hope and joy he, himself, felt after having restudied the promise of eternal life with God—Heaven!

"All of us know that Martha is at the point of death," he began, "and we have conflicting emotions about her illness. Naturally there is grief, because we will miss her as a part of our family, but we remember the words of Paul when he said in 1 Thessalonians 4:13,14 that he did not want us to sorrow, '... as others who have no hope, For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who sleep in Jesus.'

"This morning we need to ask ourselves again, 'What is this life all about?' There are those who don't believe in God, who think that nothing exists after the death of this body. They live only for money, food, and the pleasures of this world. And usually their 'pleasures' destroy them.

"Others believe that there is a God, and that they must worship him. They call him by many different names, portray him in carvings with many different forms and faces, and worship him in many different ways. Some have such shallow faith that they could be called 'believers' in name only. Others do acts of penance, often inflicting great physical pain and torture to their own bodies as a means of worshipping and serving their 'god'.

"But who is God? What do we really know of Him? How much can the human mind, with its limitations, understand of God?

"And why ask such questions? We ask because we can't really know about the place He has promised as our eternal home unless we know something about Him! We can learn about God in His word—how much He shows of His heart there! But we can also learn as we study the things around us. Paul wrote to the Roman church, '.. since the creation of the world His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead...'(1:20).

"When Darwin was developing his theory of evolution, neither our powerful microscopes nor telescopes had been developed, so he could not see the wonders that today's

scientists can see. There are still those, like Darwin, who are looking for any explanation for man and the universe that excludes belief in God. But there are also scientists who are simply studying the wonders that exist, using the powerful equipment available to them. Such true scientists are actually studying and trying to understand the mind and works of God!

"Darwin thought that a cell was only a small bit of matter, nothing at all complicated, but he couldn't see the miniature universes contained within each cell! He couldn't see the 10,000volume library that makes up the center of the cell, containing all the instructions for every activity for every cell of the body-yet somehow each cell knows exactly which page of which volume of this huge library to open and read, for the specific directions for its own work! Within each cell are factories for building from raw materials whatever that cell is supposed to make. There are also storage places, transportation systems, and disposal systems. And as scientists are able to look deeper and deeper into the cell's systems, they see even more miniscule systems and parts, perfectly designed and working together to make the cell work properly. And the cells work together to make the organ work properly, and the organs work together to make the body work properly, and even all of the separate species of life-along interconnected and non-living things—are all SO with interdependent that we can't survive without each other!

"Within each cell is a marvelous world of design and knowledge, showing the mind of God. And within each human body are 100 trillion of these amazing cells, each doing its own work, and each building its own replacement as the body renews itself! Some cells are replaced every few hours, some every seven days! Most of the body is less than one month old, with the exception of brain cells and nerve cells! What an amazing and wondrous creation we live in, yet we take it as a common thing, just because we've always lived in these bodies and because they work so amazingly well! In a lifetime, for the body to be sick is the exception, not the rule.

"To study the human body, seeing its wonders, teaches us a great respect for the power of God, for the knowledge of God, and even for His love for us, that He would entrust to our care such an astounding piece of equipment!

"But God has done more than that. We go from the parts of

a cell, some of which are millions of billionths of an inch in size, to consider the entire universe. How large is it? Who can know? Actually, is not space endless, like eternity? Even trying to think in such terms staggers our minds. Yet whole worlds of galaxies and heavenly bodies are out there, testifying to the awesome power of God.

"Light travels 186,000 miles per second. That works out to be about 6 trillion miles in a year of time. But scientists tell us that they have detected stars that are billions of trillions of miles away from the earth. BILLIONS OF YEARS OF TIME AWAY FROM US! How can we even begin to conceive of the greatness of a God who could create all of this by the simple word of His mouth!

"And yet this tremendous universe works so perfectly together that scientists can measure and study the heavenly bodies in their relationship to each other, and they can figure the exact split second when they can fire a rocket and send up a space ship to go to Mars or a satellite to go into an orbit around the earth! This requires tremendous intelligence and ábility on the part of man, but he is only performing a small incident in the midst of the unspeakably marvelous creation God has put into place!

"The earth itself is turning on its axis at the rate of 1000 miles an hour! Do you feel even a small vibration of that movement? Do you feel a single breeze? Do you live in fear of being sucked off the planet by the hurling strength of that rotation at such a speed? No, we feel nothing! Nor do we feel that we are moving at the rate of 12,000 miles an hour as our earth makes its yearly revolution around the sun! And we feel nothing of the speed as our entire galaxy is flying through space at the rate of 120,000 miles an hour! What holds us on the earth? Why don't we feel this movement? Scientists say it's gravity, but they don't really know what gravity is or what causes it or how it works!

"Hebrews 1:3 says of Christ, the Word of creation, 'who being the brightness of His glory and the express image of His person, and upholding all things by the word of His power...' Such a God made us and loves us, and such a God has said, 'Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are many mansions; if it were not

so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also.' (John 14:1-3)

"We pinch this arm and we feel substance! We touch the dirt under our feet, and subconsciously we feel that we're on solid ground—substance—REAL THINGS! Somehow, to the physical mind, this is the real—and, in contrast, that promised spiritual world is the nebulous, the almost imaginary world without substance. But we're wrong! Every second since our births, these bodies have been in a state of decay and coming death! This world is not lasting! Nothing that seems solid and real to us is of enduring substance!

"Yet the God who is eternal, who is of imperishable substance, the God who made all of this that is so wondrous to us-that God has promised, 'Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, Nor have entered into the heart of man things that God has prepared for those who love Him' (1 Corinthians 2:9). And He said through the apostle Paul in Philippians 3:20,21 concerning these amazing bodies in which we live, these bodies that are dying day by day: 'For our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body, that it may be conformed to His glorious body, according to the working by which He is able even to subdue all things to Himself.'

"This is our promise as His children, our hope, our expectation. This is the new heaven and new earth which awaits all those who are born into His family and die in faithfulness to Him, according to Revelation 2:10.

"Just before coming here to speak to you, word was brought to me that our sister Martha has died. My first feeling was sorrow, but then I thought, 'Martha has passed through the door into that real world! Martha knows—now, this minute—the splendors and wonders of that world, without the limitations of the physical! She has reached that goal all of us are looking toward! What victory! What freedom! What life!

"Brethren, let us keep our eyes fixed on that goal as we live through the dangers and hardships of this world, and let's keep heaven always in our hearts. This is the promise we have of our God! This is the God we serve!"

Let the Bible Answer

Can one be saved outside of Christ? Many millions of people believe that they can have salvation outside of Christ. There are those who follow other ways and these believe they can be saved outside of Christ. Others trust in "secular humanism" and believe that by exalting man/self they will achieve their goal. However, salvation is only in Jesus.

Jesus, as He was comforting His disciples, said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me" (John 14:6). The Son of God (and His resurrection proved He was; Rom. 1:4), proclaimed that the only way to the Father was through Him. No other way can provide salvation. Too, the Holy Spirit guided Peter to say, "neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). God has provided the salvation man needs only through Jesus Christ. God's wonderful grace has provided Christ and His precious blood which was shed for the sins of the world. (Heb. 2:9; Mt. 26:28; 1 Pet. 1:18-19; Eph. 1:7; Col. 1:14; Rom. 5:9). Without the shedding of His blood there could be no forgiveness (Heb. 9:22; Heb. 10:4; Rom. 3:23-26). God's grace has been made available to all (Heb. 2:9; 1 John 2:2; Mt. 11:28; Rev. 22:17). But this

salvation is only in Christ; it is not outside of Him. Paul informs us that all spiritual blessings are in Christ (Eph. 1:3).

How does one get into Christ? When one studies the Bible, he must study everything the Word of God says on a particular subject, not just one verse. After studying the subject completely, then he has the truth on that subject. When studying "How does one get into Christ?," one will see that there is only one way that one gets into Christ. Upon belief that Jesus is the Son of God (John 1:12), the penitent believes (Acts 17:30), confesses his belief in Jesus (Mt. 10:32; Acts 8:37; Rom. 10:10), and is baptized into Him (Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:26-27). His relationship is then changed. He is then in Christ where all spiritual blessings are (Eph. 1). He is added to the church by God (Acts 2:41,47), or as Paul put it, he is then translated into the kingdom of God's dear Son (Col. 1:13). The Holy Spirit then tells us, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit" (Rom. 8:1). We encourage you to obey the Spirit. Come to Christ. Take advantage of His gracious sacrifice for your sins. Because outside of Him, there is no hope (Eph. 2:12).

"Lord, To Whom Shall We Go?"

Jesus had just fed the five thousand. His popularity was at an all-time high. Thousands followed Him, watching what He did and listening to every word. Then Jesus began to teach them about the difficulties of following Him. As He explained some of the difficult things they would be asked to believe and do, they said, "This is a hard saying; who can hear it?" And, "Many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him" (John 6:60,66). This was a crucial time for the disciples. Would they believe the hard things, do the hard things—or would they turn back? When most of them had left, Jesus asked the twelve apostles, "Would you also go away? Simon Peter answered him, Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life" (John 6:67-68).

The question today is still, "To whom shall we go?" God has not left us without answers to our spiritual needs. For those who would seek guidance from some other source than Jesus, we need to answer the question. "To whom shall we go?" Let us apply this principle as we look at our spiritual needs.

SHALL WE LOOK FOR ANOTHER CHRIST?

John the Baptist had announced the coming of the Christ, then said of Jesus, "Behold the Lamb of God, that taketh away the sins of the world" (John 1:29). Imprisoned for preaching, John sent disciples to Jesus, "Are thou he that cometh, or look we for another?" (Matt. 11:3). Jesus merely pointed to His works and told John's disciples, "Go and tell John the things which ye hear and see." Jesus knew He was the object of Old Testament prophecies, for He told the Jews, "The Scriptures . . . bear witness of me . . . If ye believed Moses, ye would believe me; for he wrote of me" (John 5:39,46). Not just a few, but literally hundreds of prophecies are fulfilled by Jesus of Nazareth, proving Him to be the Christ. John had only to compare what Jesus did with what the prophecies had foretold to know Jesus was the promised Messiah.

The apostles were just as definite in proving His claims. Peter said, "But the things which God foreshowed by the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ should suffer, he thus fulfilled" (Acts 3:18). He later said, "To him bear all the prophets witness, that through his name every one that believeth on him shall receive remission of sins" (Acts 10:43). Paul preached the same, "And when they had fulfilled all things that were written of him, they took him down from the tree, and laid him in the tomb . . . Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; and that he was buried; and that he hath been raised on the third day according to the Scriptures" (Acts 13:29; 1 Cor. 15:3-4). John asked, "Do we look for another?" The answer is clear: there is no other, just Jesus.

SHALL WE LOOK FOR ANOTHER PROPHET?

The Scriptures had declared that God would send forth a prophet far greater than any previously known. God said to Moses, "I will raise them up a prophet from among their brethren,

like unto thee, and I will put my words in his mouth ... whosoever will not hearken unto my words, which he will speak in my name, I will require it of him" (Deut. 18:18-19). Has the prophet come, or do we look for another? This is clearly answered in the Scriptures. Peter used this prophecy as he spoke of Jesus, "Moses indeed said, A prophet shall the Lord God raise up unto you from your brethren, like unto me . . . Yea and all the prophets from Samuel and them that followed after, as many as have spoken, they also told of these days" (Acts 3:22-24). Jesus is that prophet of whom Moses wrote.

The opening sentence of Hebrews states, "God, having of old time spoken unto the fathers in the prophets ... hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son" (Heb. 1:1-2). Jesus took with him Peter, James and John up on a mountain and was "transfigured" before them. They saw Him speaking with Moses and Elijah, and suggested building a tabernacle to honor each. But God spoke from heaven about Jesus, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well-pleased; hear ye him" (Matt. 17:5). He is God's spokesman, now and for all time: "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away" (Matt. 24:35). God never promised any revelation through others—not Mary Baker Eddy, Joseph Smith nor David Koresh. If we reject Jesus, we have rejected God's only spokesman.

SHALL WE LOOK FOR ANOTHER GOSPEL?

Since the time of the apostles, men have been seeking another gospel. Paul wrote, "I marvel that ye are so quickly removing from him that called you in the grace of Christ unto a different gospel; which is not another gospel; only there are some that trouble you and would pervert the gospel of Christ. But though we, or an angel from heaven, should preach unto you any gospel other than that which we preached unto you, let him be accursed" (Gal. 1:6-8). As noted in Heb. 1:1-2, that word was not delivered in parts and sections, but God spoke through Christ. Christ chose apostles, and told them, "Whoever hears you, hears me. He that rejecteth you, rejecteth me, and he that rejecteth me, rejecteth him that sent me" (Luke 10:16). Those apostles preached and wrote the word of God (1 Thes. 2:13; 2 Tim. 3:16-17). "Contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 3).

There are still those who seek some kind of "latter day revelation." But the gospel was completely delivered by the apostles nearly 2,000 years ago: "His divine power hath granted unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness" (2 Pet. 1:3). The inspired Scriptures were given, "That the man of God may be complete, furnished completely unto every good work" (2 Tim. 3:17). Please read those again. God has given us, in the Scriptures, everything we need in the spiritual realm. The apostle warns, "Whosoever goeth onward and abideth not in the teaching of Christ, hath not God: he that abideth in the teaching, the same hath both the Father and the Son" (2 John 9). We must not "go beyond the things that are written" (1 Cor. 4:6). We do not need another gospel. That word was "Confirmed unto us by them that heard him" by signs and miracles (Heb. 2:3-4), including the miracles that Jesus did (John 20:30-31). That gospel was preached by men inspired of God, and is "the power of God unto salvation" (Rom. 1:16).

SHALL WE LOOK FOR ANOTHER CHURCH?

Much has been preached about "the church of your choice." As a result, many people question whether or not the true church even exists on earth today. Jesus promised, "I will build my church" (Matt. 16:18). He died for that church, "Gave himself up for it" (Eph. 5:25) and purchased that church with His own blood (Acts 20:28). That church is the body of Christ: "He is the head of the body, the church . . . There is one body" (Col. 1:18; Eph. 4:4). That church is composed of those who are saved, "The Lord added to the church daily such as were being saved" (Acts 2:47). Jesus never built "churches." He built one church. He never built denominations, so people could have a choice. Jesus loves His church, and gave Himself for that church (Eph. 5:25). Should we "look for another?"

Some may argue their "right" to the church of their choice. But does the Lord give them that right? He built His church, He purchased that church with His own blood, those whom He saves He adds to His church, and He is the Savior of His church (Eph. 5:23). Then why would anyone want to look for another? "In none other is there salvation, neither is there any other name under heaven, given among me, wherein we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). On Pentecost, people believed in the Lord and were

told, "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins" (Acts 2:38). Their response? "As many as received his word were baptized, and there were added unto them in that day about three thousand souls. . . The Lord added to the church daily such as were being saved" (Acts 2:41,47).

Today, when people obey the same "form of teaching" (Rom. 6:17) those folk did, the Lord adds them to the same church. That is the church Jesus built, of which He is head and which He purchased with His blood. We don't need another Christ. We don't need another prophet. We don't need another gospel. And we don't need another church. Let us learn to accept Christ, to accept what He does for us, and to accept His plan for us. "Lord, to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life."

How Is One Saved After Baptism?

The apostle Paul writes, "Are ye ignorant that all we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?" (Rom. 6:3). Because baptism puts us "into Christ" (Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27) and is "unto the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38; 22:16), it is no wonder that Jesus promised, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). But the Bible does not teach that immersion in water saves us eternally! The act of baptism ushers us into the body of Christ (Acts 2:41,47; 1 Cor. 12:13). It is then that our life as a soldier in the army of the Lord begins (Eph. 6:10-17; 2 Tim. 2:4). We should then "continue steadfastly in the apostles' teaching in fellowship, in breaking of bread and prayers" (Acts 2:42), as we "do good unto all men" (Gal. 6:10).

Being baptized into Christ does not guarantee that we will never sin. In fact, Christians are told, "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us . . . If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not is us" (1 John 1:8-10). When we sin, after becoming Christians, we are to repent of those sins, confess our faults and pray to

God through Christ for forgiveness (1 John 1:7-9). Our relationship with God after baptism is that of a child with his Father. We have the privilege of prayer through which to call upon Him. Because we have been "baptized into Christ Jesus ... baptized into his death" (Rom. 6:3), we have the promise that His blood will continue to cleanse us as Christians. "If we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). To walk in the light means that we constantly strive to live for God, "Growing in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Pet. 3:18) as we endeavour to "keep yourselves in the love of God" (Jude 21).

According to 1 John, the doctrine of "sinless perfection" is false. That doctrine essentially states that a child of God cannot commit sin, that he can never be lost and come under the condemnation of God. But, "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8). And two verses before is found this warning to Christians, "If we say that we have fellowship with him [God] and walk in the darkness. we lie, and do not the truth" (1 John 1:6). Christians can sin, they DO sin (1 John 1:8,10), and if they persist in sin—thus "walking in darkness"-they are no longer in fellowship with God (1 John 1:6) and are under His just condemnation. It is true that the dedicated child of God does not lead an habitual life of sin (Rom. 6:12; 1 John 3:6-9), but is also true that Christians do commit sin. When we thus sin, we should gratefully remember that "the blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth us from all sin" and that "we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ, the righteous" (1 John 1:7; 2:1).

Christianity—A Unique Religion

A unique quality of the Christian faith is its uniqueness. It is "One of a kind." This fact has been forgotten by some, and deliberately overlooked by others. Yet, the church of Jesus Christ has always been separate, and different from all other

religions, movements, denominations, or sects in the world. It stands alone as God's kingdom in the world. It cannot be assimilated into any existing religion, nor can it co-exist with and fellowship any denomination or sect.

The early church suffered persecution because it would not merge itself with the existing Jewish faith. Paul said that those who did such were 'fallen from grace' (Galatians 5:1-4). Later, gnosticism raised its ugly face in the church, claiming a "secret knowledge" apart from the revealed Word. John condemned such, along with all others who would go beyond the teaching of Christ (II John 9-11). As time went on, another danger confronted the church as it merged with the existing Roman government to form the Holy Roman Empire. This completed its total apostasy from the truth.

Today, the church faces another great danger. That of the philosophy of pluralism. The dominating philosophy in our nation today declares that there are no absolutes. Everyone can believe what they want, and no one is to challenge them, or tell them that they are wrong. This philosophy has crept into the church and some of our preachers and teachers are saying the same thing. You might recognize it as what the denominations have been saying all along.

There are four important factors which make the Christian faith unique:

(1) WE HAVE A UNIQUE AUTHORITY, THE BIBLE

There is no other book like it in the world. It is the only book from God. The only book inspired by the Holy Spirit (II Timothy 3:16-17). It contains all we need to know to obey God and to get to heaven. In fact, we are warned not to add to it, or take from it in any way. Thus, all other authorities are excluded.

(2) WE HAVE A UNIQUE SAVIOR, JESUS CHRIST

He himself declared, "I am the way, the truth, and the life, no man comes to the Father but by Me" (John 14:6). The only way to God is through Jesus Christ. He alone was God, in human flesh. He alone lived a perfect life. He alone died as a sacrifice for our sins, satisfying the justice of God. He alone arose from the dead, never to die again. Christianity is unique,

because it offers the only way for man to make himself right with God, and to obtain eternal salvation in heaven.

(3) WE HAVE A UNIQUE ORGANISATION, THE CHURCH OF CHRIST

There is no other group in the world like the Lord's church. It alone follows God's pattern for His people, and thus is of God. All other groups are of men. It alone is the spiritual body of Christ in the world, composed of all the saved. It cannot be a denomination, for it is one body (Ephesians 4:4; Colossians 1:18). Its worship, teachings fellowship and mission are unique, and separate from all other organisations.

(4) WE HAVE A UNIQUE WAY TO ENTER THE CHURCH, THE NEW BIRTH

Jesus declared that you must be born again, of the water and the Spirit to enter the kingdom of God (John 3:5). No religion in the world has anything comparable to the new birth of the Christian faith. Only those who believe in Jesus as the Son of God, repent of their sins, confess Him as the Son of God, and are baptized into Christ in water, for the remission of their sins, are saved. There is no other way to obtain salvation. Those who obey the Gospel in this way are added to the one body of Christ (the church) by God and have the hope of eternal life if they remain faithful.

The Christian faith is unique and exclusive. It allows for no other way. It cannot be merged with any other way. Only those who accept its authority and Savior and obey its commands will be saved (John 12:50a).

Mirrors

If a person realizes he is not the kind of Christian he ought to be, he can make a few outward changes simply to satisfy his own conscience. Of course, this is not what God expects of him.

(3) CHANGE HIS LIFE

If a person looks into the law of liberty and finds there are things he needs to change, God expects this person to change his life to meet the requirements of salvation.
